SPEAKERS:

Prof Guy Goodwin is Head of the Department of Psychiatry and W A Handley Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Oxford. His research interests are in the treatment of bipolar disorder and the application of neuroscience to understanding the neurobiology of mood disorder and developing new treatments. Currently, he is involved in projects on the neurobiology of vulnerability to mood disorder, and the psychopharmacology of emotional processing. He is a PI in the pragmatic clinical trial of maintenance treatment in bipolar affective disorder, BALANCE I. He has served as a member of the Wellcome Trust Neurosciences Panel and the Council of the British Association for Psychopharmacology, and currently sits on the Evaluation Committee for neuroscience, neurology and psychiatry of the Agence Nationale de Recherche, France. He is a foreign corresponding fellow of the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology, was the elected president of the British Association for Psychopharmacology in 2004-2006, and is a current member of the Executive Council of European College of Neuropsychopharmacology.

Prof Tony Bailey is Cheryl and Reece Scott Professor of Autism Research at the University of Oxford. This is the first Chair in the UK that is dedicated to autism research. He has had a long interest in this area, since his work as an MRC training fellow at the Institute of Psychiatry on the follow-up to the first twin study of autism. He came to Oxford for two main reasons. First, to work more closely with the Wellcome Trust Centre for Human Genetics, with whom he had been searching for susceptibility genes since 1995. He coordinates the International Molecular Genetic Study of Autism Consortium, a collaboration between scientists in seven countries to identify autism susceptibility genes. Secondly, he came to Oxford to implement a plan to use a new magneto-encephalographic (MEG) scanner, which can record brain activity in real time by detecting the very weak magnetic fields produced by nerve cells. The scanner has just opened, and will allow researchers to monitor brain responses of children and adults with autism or Asperger's syndrome. Clinically, he is developing services for people with autism spectrum disorders in the Thames Valley area.

Dr Andrew McBride has been a Consultant Psychiatrist with the Specialist Community Addiction Service since May 2002. He is Clinical Director for Specialist Services with Oxfordshire Community Mental Healthcare Trust. Previously he was Clinical Director of the Community Addiction Unit in Cardiff and Vale Trust and before this he established Mid Glamorgan Community Drug and Alcohol Team. Publications have touched on alcohol detoxication, amphetamines, anabolic steroid use, needle fixation and OTC drug misuse. He co-edited the introductory textbook "Working with Substance Misusers: a guide to theory and practice" for Routledge, and co-edited "Injecting Illicit Drugs," published by Blackwells in 2005.

Dr Christopher Bass is Consultant in Liaison Psychiatry at the John Radcliffe Hospital, Oxford, and Honorary Senior Clinical Lecturer in Psychiatry at the University of Oxford. He is the author or co-author of several influential texts in psychosomatic medicine, including 'Somatisation: Physical symptoms and Psychological illness', 'Treatment of Functional Somatic Symptoms', 'Contemporary Approaches to the Science of Hysteria: Clinical and Theoretical Perspectives', and, most recently, 'Malingering and Illness Deception'.

Dr Matthew Taylor has trained in Cambridge and Oxford, and is now a Wellcome Trust Research Training Fellow. His research interests focus on the pathophysiology and treatment of mood disorders using a range of neural imaging and meta-analytic techniques.
