Speakers:

Prof Paul Harrison trained in psychiatry in Oxford and London. His research thesis was on gene expression in Alzheimer's disease, but since 1991 has focused on the molecular basis and neuropathology of schizophrenia. He was a Wellcome Senior Research Fellow before being appointed to his present position in 1997. His group's research currently centres on understanding how susceptibility genes for schizophrenia may operate. Clinically, his focus is treatment resistant depression and psychosis.

Dr Anne Stewart is a Consultant Adolescent Psychiatrist in Oxford City CAMHS. She trained at St. Barts Hospital, London, and Oxford, and has been a Consultant in Oxford since 1993. She is a qualified cognitive therapist and provides teaching and supervision for the Oxford Cognitive Therapy Centre. She has a particular interest in early intervention in adolescent mental health problems and has developed guidelines on management of self harm in schools. Her research interests are in adolescent eating disorders, self harm and depression

Prof Robin Jacoby is Professor Emeritus of Old Age Psychiatry and editor of the "Oxford Textbook of Old Age Psychiatry". He studied modern languages (Russian and French) at Oxford, followed by medicine at Oxford and Guy's. He trained in internal medicine and gastroenterology in Southampton University Hospitals where he was a senior house officer and medical registrar. He undertook psychiatric training at the Bethlem Royal and Maudsley Hospitals, where he was also a consultant for ten years before moving to Oxford in 1994. With Dr Catherine Oppenheimer he edited three editions of Psychiatry in the Elderly published by Oxford University Press. He is Chairman of The Global Initiative on Psychiatry, an international charity dedicated to reform of psychiatry in countries of the former Soviet bloc.

Dr Zafra Cooper is Principal Clinical Research Fellow and Deputy Director of Centre for Research on Eating Disorders at Oxford (CREDO). She is the author of "Cognitive-Behavioral Treatment of Obesity".

Prof Phil Cowen trained in medicine at University College Hospital, London, and in psychiatry at King's College Hospital. He then worked in the MRC Unit of Clinical Pharmacology in Oxford, where he studied basic neuropharmacology and its application to clinical psychopharmacology. Since 1983 he has been MRC Clinical Scientist and Honorary Consultant Psychiatrist in the Department of Psychiatry in Oxford. He was appointed to his current post in the University of Oxford in 1997. He is an author of the "Shorter Oxford Textbook of Psychiatry" and his main interests are in the biochemistry and treatment of mood disorders.

Access

Parking at the Richard Doll Building like most sites within the city is very restricted. Pay and Display parking at the nearby Churchill Hospital currently costs around £10 per day.

Bus services to the Churchill Hospital include the Thornhill Park & Ride from the ring road, service 15 from St Aldate's and service 5 from the railway station.
